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### **National Careers Week and Skills Builder Challenge Day**









At the start of March, the children took part in **National Careers Week** (1<sup>st</sup> – 6<sup>th</sup> March). The children learnt about different professions and took part in our first ever remote **Skills Builder Challenge Day**. Well done to all our children for completing the Challenge Day in different circumstances to previous years! You all did so well and worked through the day using your essential skills:

















EYFS took part in the Challenge Day *Free to be Me* and designed their own superheroes. Year 1 – 6 took part in the **Greeting's Card Challenge** and worked through the process of designing and making Greeting's Cards.

On Thursday the 4<sup>th</sup> March, it was **World Book Day** and the children learnt about different professions in the world of publishing.




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### **Arctic Fox Virtual Trip with Lloyds Bank**


As part of the Skills Builder programme, Year 4 was set an assignment by **Lloyds Bank**. We had to come up with ideas to make it easier for Lloyds Bank employees to work from home. We were split up into 6 groups, and each group had to come up with their own idea to help. Lloyds Bank sent us a presentation explaining the task in detail. Once we went through that, we quickly got started brainstorming our ideas. This enterprise project involved teamwork and creativity.



- 3. Name Ice Cream Club
  Idea The Rubbish Cat
  Description The Rubbish Cat helps keep
  your home or office clean by eating
  garbage littered on the floor. It uses this
  garbage to recharge its batteries and all
  that comes out is clean air!
- 4. Name Action Wizards
  Idea The Robot with a hologram watch
  Description The central idea here was to
  invent a robot with a hologram watch. The
  team invented this imaginative idea to tell
  the time when no watch or time teller is at
  hand.

Here's a brief summary of each group's idea:

- 1. Name Super foxes
  Idea Doggy Walkie Tunnels
  Description The Doggy Walkie Tunnels
  are a maze of tunnels where you can drop
  off your dog and robots walk it through the
  tunnels for as long as you like, freeing you
  up to concentrate on your office work!
- 2. Name Shanky Doodlers Idea Shanky the Dog Description Shanky the Dog is a robot dog that understands human emotions and feelings. He's around to lift your mood if you are feeling sad. He can also play with you if you want or help you fetch items. He learns your routine and the screen fitted on his belly predicts what work you need to do next.



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### 5. Name - Black Swans

Idea - High tech Cube Room

Description - Black Swan's idea was to design a pocket-sized, super high-tech cube which when thrown on the floor, turns into a fully equipped sealed room large enough to have business meetings. The cube is made of expandable sound-proof material and has censors to check your temperature and if you are ill, you are not permitted to enter.

### 6. Name – AEMJ

Idea - The Flying Whiteboard

Description – A drone with a box attached beneath containing worksheets that the drone can fly to your colleagues. Also attached is a whiteboard that you can write on and use as a phone when you can't find any other way to speak to your business associates.

#### Conclusion:

The Lloyds Bank team of five professionals said they were very impressed with the originality and imagination of the pitches. They said all the teams had excellent and innovative ideas that could really revolutionise and improve the way we work from home.




















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# World Book Day 4th March 2021 Share a Story

story characters.










In Key Stage One, children shared a range of art and craft activities inspired by their favourite stories. In Year 2 they also created their own comic book versions of well-known texts.











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We thoroughly enjoyed participating in Shakespeare Week this year which was coordinated by the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust. 







These are some of the books we will be reading to help us learn about the Right of the Month, Global Goal 15, National Gardening Week and Mother Earth Day.

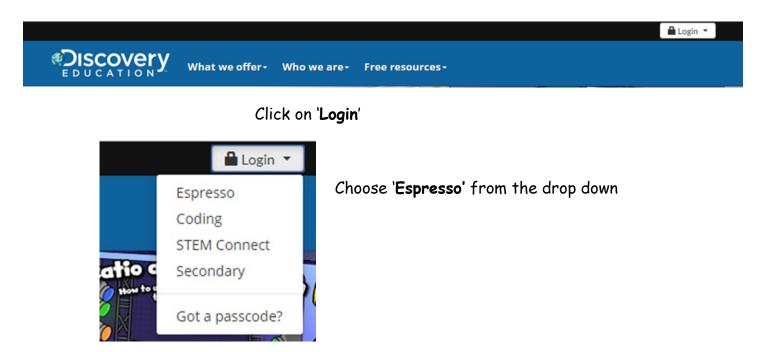

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### **ESPRESSO HOME ACCESS**

Espresso Home Access is filled with wonderful resources across all subject areas for children to access from home. Please follow the instructions on how to get into all the great material. Type in the username and password that your class teacher has given you. If you have forgotten it, please ask.



Click on espresso and you are able to access all of the resources. There are fantastic activities, videos and printable resources for all year groups. You can use espresso on both PCs and iPads. Some activities require Adobe flash.

**Doodle Maths** is an app that allows children to practise their mathematical skills independently, both in school and at home. **Doodle Maths** works by assessing areas of maths that children complete easily or find challenging; it then re-assigns questions to teach children new mathematical learning in small steps.

Your child has been given a **username** and **password**, and has been shown how to log in and use **Doodle Maths**.

It is very important that children complete the activities on **Doodle Maths** independently so that the app can assess which areas they need further practice in. Please do not help your children by giving them the answers, but direct them to the hints and explanations that can be found in the help section at the top of each question.

To link with your child's account, follow these simple steps:

- Download the **Doodle Maths** app;
- Ask your child to sign in, using the details they have been given;
- Tap on the Grown Ups section and follow the instructions there to link yourself to your child;
- Login to <a href="https://www.parents.doodlemaths.com">www.parents.doodlemaths.com</a> with your Grown Ups username and password and click on Monitor Live so you can see how your child is doing as they complete their exercise; and
- Download the Parent Connect app where you can see a snapshot of what your child is doing. Encourage your child/ren to earn at least 50 Doodle Stars a week and get instant updates through your app.
