

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Number Facts Bee for Years 1 to 3



On Thursday 16th January, we held the Number Facts Bee for years 1-3. I was so impressed with the calibre of participants and the enthusiasm of the audience to support their peers. Each class had held an in class competition to choose 2 children who would like to compete in the assembly. It is quite daunting standing in front of almost 120 children so I congratulate all the competitors for their confidence. In Year 1, the questions included numbers facts to 5 and to all the numbers up to 10. The children were so strong at answering the questions in their own time -9-4,6+? =8-that we needed to include an element of competition who answered fastest. Our runners up were Mya, Saya and Zachary (Cherry) and the eventual winner was Zachary (Bonsai).

In Year 2, the competition was also extremely tight and the children showed a good knowledge of number bonds to 20, missing number questions (13 + ? = 18) and adding by crossing the 10s boundary (6+7). The winner in year 2 - was Adriano and the runners up were Evelyn, Dori, Olivia.

In Year 3 we moved into the times tables, where the children showed really strong knowledge of the multiplication and division facts that they have been learning. The competition was separated by the tiniest of hairs as children answered on the buzzer questions within nano seconds of each other. I was extremely impressed with their knowledge and with the way they dealt with both winning and losing. In Year 3 the winner was Yuguo, and Jules, Akira and Hugo W were the runners up.

Well done to everyone that took part whether in class or in the assembly. Please continue to practise your Number Facts.

Skill of the Month

This month we have focused upon 'Problem Solving' in our classrooms and assemblies. Why not try to solve a problem at home and imagine different ways to solve it.

Consider this problem: Imagine you and your friends or family are in a shrinking space.

You need to:

- Choose 2-3 people to join you.
- 2. Use a rope (or something similar) to make a shape on the floor that everyone can fit into.
- Slowly shrink the space every 1-2 minutes.
- 4. Generate a range of solutions to figure out how to keep everyone within the shrinking boundaries.

Extension: Try again, but include more people in the shrinking circle!

Reflection Questions

Getting Started: What are the instructions?

Intermediate: How can you come up with lots of possible solutions?

Advanced: Why is it important to consider a range of solutions for problems?

Mastery: How might you choose between different solutions to a complex problem?

Come and Learn about Science in Year 4


Friday March 7th at 9am Middle Floor Hall

PUNCTUALITY and ATTENDANCE

Punctuality

Children are happier when they arrive punctually at school and their learning gets off to a fine start. We have many incentives to encourage children to arrive punctually, including certificates and medals.



Please remember:

- The school gates open at 8.45am and children are able to go straight to their classes.
- School starts at 8.55am but we give you a 5-minute grace period to account for exceptional circumstances; therefore, any child arriving at or after 9am will be marked late.

Timings for the end of the day will be as follows:

Nursery door will open at 2.50pm. (Children not collected by 3 will incur a charge.) **Reception** and **Year 1** doors will open at 3.25pm.

- Year 2 line up outside the Reception play area at 3.30pm, flanking the fence in front of the hand washing trough, by the office as you come down the lane from Upper Street.
- Years 3 6 will be brought down to the playground at 3.30pm. Please could parents wait near to where their child's class lines up, avoiding bottlenecking by the extension of the Morris Building. Children will not be dismissed as they come out and down the stairs only from their line.
- Any children not collected on time will be taken to Kids' Club where a charge will apply from 3.40pm.

It is really important to a child's feeling of security that they are brought in regularly and that parents arrive and depart promptly once they are settled. Children who arrive late can become distressed and find it hard to settle to their activities. Again, at home time, please collect your child promptly as they can become very anxious if you are late.

Attendance

The school and Educational Welfare officers monitor attendance on a regular basis. We expect children to have at least 95% attendance. If your child's attendance falls below 95% then the Educational Welfare Officer will contact you. A child is considered a persistent absentee once their attendance falls to 90%.

Please let us know of any changes in your child's home life, routines or health that may affect their attendance or punctuality at school, so we can support you accordingly. If you would like any more details about punctuality and attendance, please see Penny in the school office.



What do I do if my child is sick?

- 1. If your child is sick please inform the school office on the first day of absence.
- On your child's return to school please bring a
 note to the school office explaining why your child
 was absent. If your child is absent directly before
 or after a holiday you will need to bring in medical
 proof to support the absence.

What if I need to apply for leave during term time?

Any leave of absence has to be applied for, four weeks in advance, using the appropriate forms from the school office; each case is reviewed individually but please be aware that absence will be authorised in only the most exceptional of circumstances. **Holidays during term time will never be authorised.**

We award children medals and badges for 100% attendance and punctuality over a term and for over the whole year. Well done and thank you to everyone who continue to help reduce our absences, cooperating with procedures required by the Department for Education (DfE).

What about medical appointments?

Please try to avoid making dental or medical appointments for your child during the school day; if an appointment is absolutely necessary please show your appointment card (preferably in advance) to the school office as evidence for this absence.

Any unauthorised absence may result in an immediate penalty notice of £80 per parent per child from Islington's Educational Welfare Department.
