Year 2 trip to Central Mosque

In Year 2, we are currently learning about Islam in RE. As part of our learning, we visited the London Central Mosque near Regent's Park! Upon arrival, we were greeted by Mohamed, our guide for the duration of the visit. He told us all about the history of the building and how the land was gifted to the Muslim Community of Great Britain in 1940. We then walked to the prayer room and removed our shoes before entering. We were told that thousands of people come to pray in this mosque, and because of the shape of the room with its dome, the Imam doesn't need a microphone because the sound travels through the space so well. After that, Mohamed took us to the exhibition room, and we had a chance to learn more about Islam, including The Five Pillars of Islam.



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Poet visit

Paul Lyalls, the poet, who has had one of his poems sent in to space by NASA, came to our school and did a workshop on how to write a perfect poem. The first thing he got us to do was answer four questions (write down a memory, something you had to do, something you know and a philosophical question.) Once we had answered the questions he told us to choose one of the answers to be our poem title. He told us to write three sentences that had something to do with the title that had 5-7 words and they could be as creative and imaginative as we liked. He also told us to make each sentence three fingers apart. We were told to go over our poems and make sure we hadn't used the same word twice (little words excluded my, me etc.) If we had used the same word twice we would have to write a synonym or a simile in the place of that word. The reason he told us to leave a three finger space in between the sentences, was because we would be writing 2-3 sentences in between each line. Once we had finished writing our sentences we had written perfect poems. We were allowed to read our poems to the whole class. Not everybody read their poems to the class but they were amazing even if they weren't read.

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School Leaders from India visit William Tyndale

William Tyndale hosted a delegation of 60 Education leaders from India at the end of last term at the request of one of our parents who works with Schools there.

Every year the Indian Chamber of Commerce wing, FICCI Arise (Federation of Indian Chamber of Commerce and Industry -Alliance for Re-Imagining School Education) visits the UK to attend the biggest Education Tech conference, BETT in London. Every delegation has a focus on learning from best practices in schools and this year it was Early Years and technology.

Sophie (Assistant Head Teacher) and Toni (Year 6 Teacher and Computing Lead)



gave a presentation on William Tyndale's vision for education and how technology is integrated into the curriculum. The delegates then had the chance to meet the school's Digital Warriors and see some of their projects. This was then followed by a tour of the school.



We were thrilled to hear how impressed the delegates were with their visit, especially the comments about how happy the children were and the quality of education we are providing. One of the delegates, Dr Swati Popat Vats is President of a Group of schools with over 200,000 students and is a leader in Early Childhood Education will hopefully be collaborating with our team to share good practice between our respective

countries. Another delegate Dr Joseph Emmanuel is the Director of Academics for India's biggest curriculum and exam body the CBSE commented on how much learning he would take back to colleagues in India. The CBSE accredit over 30,000 schools world wide! Our William Tyndale parent said 'It was a lovely opportunity for my personal and professional life to combine. I am so happy to say that when we took feedback from delegates, the visit to William Tyndale was rated the most highly in terms of relevance, learning and organisation compared to the other schools we visited. The children were amazing and it was really difficult to tear visitors away and get them back on the coach for the next visit!'

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National School Sports Week

DID YOU KNOW?

- Fewer than half of all children and young people in the UK (47%) are meeting the Chief Medical Officer guidelines of taking part in 60 minutes of sport and physical activity per day (Sport England, 2022).
- Almost a quarter (23.4%) of children in the UK are obese by the time they reach Year 6 (NCMP, 2022).
- There is a positive association between levels of sport and physical activity and young peoples' mental wellbeing, resilience, community development and reduced loneliness (Sport England, 2022).
- 91% of primary aged pupils say being active helps them learn (spear, 2021).
- There is a positive link between physical activity and emotional regulation. Physical activity positively predicts academic achievement through self-regulation (Vasilopoulos et al. 2021).
 Make the <u>#PledgeToPlay</u> today and commit to getting children and young people in your care ac-

tive for a minimum of 60 minutes a day during National School Sports Week.

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

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Reading and Maths Resources

All children from Year 1 upwards have an individual Reading Eggs password. Please ask your class teacher if you need your password.

All children from Year 1 upwards receive a login to Doodle Maths.

Doodle Maths is an app that allows children to practise their mathematical skills independently, both in school and at home. **Doodle Maths** works by assessing areas of maths that children complete easily or find challenging; it then re-assigns questions to teach children new mathematical learning in small steps.

Your child has been given a **username** and **password**, and has been shown how to log in and use **Doodle Maths**. It is very important that children complete the activities on **Doodle Maths** independently so that the app can assess which areas they need further practice in. Please do not help your children by giving them the answers, but direct them to the hints and explanations that can be found in the help section at the top of each question.

To link with your child's account, follow these simple steps:

- Download the **Doodle Maths** app;
- Ask your child to sign in, using the details they have been given;
- Tap on the Grown Ups section and follow the instructions there to link yourself to your child;
- Login to <u>www.parents.doodlemaths.com</u> with your Grown Ups username and password and click on Monitor Live so you can see how your child is doing as they complete their exercise; and
- Download the Parent Connect app where you can see a snapshot of what your child is doing. Encourage your child/ren to earn at least 50 Doodle Stars a week and get instant updates through your app.
